



## CNAA

Cottonmill and Nunnery Allotment Association (CNAA) was established in 1994 to support plot holders on its four allotment sites in St Albans: Cottonmill; Nunnery 1; Nunnery 2; Sopwell Mill.

It provides assistance to St Albans Council in managing the sites and improving facilities for plot holders.

Directly for members, it co-ordinates affiliation to relevant bodies, insurance cover, procurement opportunities and social events.

## What has Lockdown Life been like for your group?

For many members of CNAA, their allotment provided a safe place to go for their daily exercise during the first lockdown and for many who were working from home, it provided an opportunity to spend time tending their plot other than just at the weekend.

Growing their own food meant that people were less reliant on deliveries or visits to shops. However, the two lockdowns later in the year have been blighted by very wet weather and this reduced the opportunity to spend time and get exercise at the allotments.
