

DAVE KOTULA BIOGRAPHY

Dave Kotula was born in St Albans City Hospital in 1965. He grew up in a council house in Manor Rd, London Colney, and went to school in the village. He's the youngest of three children.

Dave has a mixed Ukrainian/Polish and English heritage. His father, Wasyl, was an ethnic Ukrainian who grew up in a village called Rownia in South East Poland. Wasyl's family were torn apart during WWII. After spending time as a forced labourer (aged 16), he managed to escape and join the allied forces. Wasyl arrived as a refugee in England, in 1946. He never saw his homeland or family again. Dave's mother, Joyce, grew up in Barnet and had close family connections to St Albans and Hertfordshire.

Dave's early passion for photography was inspired by his grandfather's many photographs, coupled with his interest in recording the social history of ordinary people around him.

In the 80s he was involved with radical politics from the Miners' Strike to the Anti-Poll Tax protests. After visiting his first squat in Gombards, he realised that taking direct action could allow you to live a freer life. He lived in several squats across St Albans from 1986-1992. The most significant being Lattimore Road.




Dave's favourite camera was a 35mm Pentax SFX SLR. The great lens and innovative built in autofocus, enabled him to take his trademark pictures; quick, naturalistic and showing real life. His film of choice was B&W Ilford XP1.

The pictures taken in the squats of St Albans form the cornerstone of his 80s work. These images of a forgotten era are treasured by the people in them, even though they are often looking back on their difficult pasts. This exhibition is an opportunity for Dave to show their stories in a positive and human

In the early 90s he left the insecurities of squatting behind. He met his wife, Antoinette, and moved to Luton where they have brought up their two children. Dave currently works at a university in London.
